fifty five dollars and fifty three cent paid therefrom from January 1<sup>st</sup> 1842  
till paid that they pay to the Plaintiff their cost by sum on the cause

This cause was this day dictated by consent of parties and by the court comitted  
to be heard on the bill amercing valuable and defensives of Williams and was argued  
by counsel on both sides of which court by virtue of the authority vested in  
the Court by the act of the general assembly of Virginia passed January  
2d 1846 referred to in the proceedings the Court doth adjudge order  
and direct that Thomas E Elbow and W W Scott who are hereby appointed  
commissioners for the purpose of affixing a writ of attachment to the property  
of Williams in some paper published in the town of Petersburg and in the city  
of Norfolk and at Dumaine and other suitable place in the County of Southampton  
to sell at public auction or the premises the land in the proceedings mentioned  
known as popularly known as a tract of land containing two and three equal annual  
payments required out of cash enough to pay the expenses of the sale and  
the sale taking from the purchaser a purchase bond with good security  
and retaining a lease over the land until the purchase money is paid  
and the said commissioners are authorized in making said sale to sell the  
whole tract together or to sell the same in parcels as they may find the  
interests of the parties require and they will make Report of their  
proceedings to Court.
