The plaintiff this day filed his bill in Court praying for an injunction against the defendants until it is otherwise adjudged and decreed that upon the plaintiff's demand for ^{the same} return at least in the Clerk's Office of this Court in the penalty of one hundred dollars with security who shall justify on oath as to his sufficiency conditioned to pay and satisfy the defendant all such costs shall be adjudged shown in case the said injunction be dissolved. An injunction is awarded to the plaintiff to restrain the defendant Edward W. Haysburg from selling the slave Dick Henry. Albeit and Done in the full faith and belief of the justice of the Court and the Sheriff of this Court is required to take into his possession the said slave viz his slave and not return to Court the bonds taken for their hire. But in case the said Samuel D. Nicholas or some one for him shall enter suit with security who shall justify on oath as to his or their sufficiency in the penalty of fifty or hundred dollars payable to the plaintiff conditioned to show the said slave forthcoming to abide any decree that may be made in this Court and pay and satisfy the plaintiff whatever may be awarded to him in this Court the Sheriff will return the said slave to the defendant Nicholas and return the said suit to the Court.
