This day came on again to be heard on the papers formally read and the report of Commissioner Subell made pursuant to a decree of this Court entered at this term and to which report no exceptions have been filed and was argued by Counsel on consideration whereof the Court doth adjudge, order and decree that the said report be by confirmed and it appearing to the Court from the report of Commissioner Subell that the tract of land in the bill mentioned cannot be divided and that Junius W. Williams who has purchased the shares of all the heirs at law except the infant Jacob P. Williford is willing to take the said land and pay to him the sum of fifty five dollars the value of his undivided interest as reported by the Commissioner and Junius W. Williams the purchaser and Lucinda A. Williford, Thomas Hart and C. D. Hart his wife, Allen Hall and M. B. Hall his wife, E. W. Saunders and S. B. Saunders his wife, Watter R. Williford, and S. B. Williford themselves and heirs at law consenting that the Court doth adjudge, order and decree that C. L. Story who is hereby appointed special Commissioner for that purpose shall convey with special warranty to Junius Williams all the right title and interest which he claims in the said tract of land lying in Southamptown whereof Samuel B. Williford died seized and possessed containing one hundred and ninety four acres and the Court doth further adjudge, order and decree that upon payment by Junius Williams to the lawful guardians of Jacob P. Williford the sum of fifty five dollars the value of his interest in the said tract of land as ascertained by the Commissioner's report the said C. L. Story shall then convey with special warranty the said Jacob P. Williford's interest in the said land to Junius W. Williams and the said C. L. Story shall report his proceedings to Court in order to a further decree.
