

he would <sup>Nicholas</sup> kill all the white people. She did not see Solomon after being imprisoned the witness says she saw Daniel twice once at the table of one in the corner of the fence near the well. She also saw the same Solomon once. Kelly a negro woman being duly charged & sworn Testifies that she was at the meeting on the day aforesaid. She does not know that she saw the prisoner or either of them there. She does not know them.

Davy a negro man being duly charged & sworn Testifies that he was at Bantle's meeting house on the 23<sup>d</sup> of August last where many persons were assembled. He knows Daniel he saw him at the meeting house but knows nothing of his being engaged or concerned in conspiring, advising or consulting to rebel or make insurrection. Witness not being acquainted with the other prisoner Solomon and is unable to say whether he knew him there or not.

Robert a negro man slave being duly charged & sworn Testifies that he was at Bantle's meeting house on the day aforesaid. He saw Daniel & Solomon the prisoners both there. He heard a conversation between Nicholas a negro (who was yesterday examined) and the prisoners, and 20 or 30 other negroes being present, Nicholas proposed that those present should kill all the white people. Daniel one of the prisoners said if the British come through here he would join them but he would not go away to join them. Witness heard Solomon the other prisoner say at the same time if they come through he would join to go with them but not say what he would do. This conversation occurred about 10 or a fortnight from the place near the meeting house.

Henry a negro man being duly charged & sworn Testifies that he knows Daniel and saw him at the meeting house on the day aforesaid. Simply spoke to him. He held no conversation with him nor did he see or hear Daniel hold any conversation with any other person. Witness does not recollect seeing Solomon on that day.

Kelly a negro man being duly charged & sworn Testifies that he was at the meeting house. Witness saw Daniel there but did not see Solomon.

Reddick a negro man being duly charged & sworn Testifies that he was at the meeting house. Saw Daniel but did not speak to him. Solomon he does not know.

The evidence being closed and the prisoners being heard in their defence by Robert Collier &c. their counsel in their defence. The Court upon mature consideration of the evidence and all the circumstances of the case are unanimously of opinion that the prisoners are guilty of the offence of which they stand charged and it being seen and of them if any thing for themselves they have or know to say why the Court should not now proceed to pronounce judgment against them and nothing being offered or alleged in delay of judgment it is considered by the Court that the prisoners be hanged by the neck until they be dead and that the Sheriff do execution of this judgment on Sunday the 20<sup>th</sup> day of October next between the hours of 10 O'clock in the morning & 3 O'clock in the evening of the same day.

And the Court in the circumstances of the case recommend to the Governor to commute the death of these prisoners to transportation.
