This day came the parties by their attorneys and the defendant by his attorney pleaded not guilty, to which the plaintiff by his attorney replied generally and thereupon came a jury consisting of George W. Sprague, E. H. Barnes, A. J. Miles, Farlow W. Scott, Calvin H. Scarborough, Elisha Darden, Medeari Bradshaw, Jeremiah Norfleet, Wm. J. Cobb, Wm. A. Holland, R. B. Brewster, and Wm. Gay who being impanelled and sworn to try the issue joined in this cause, and having heard the evidence and the argument of counsel, unanimously agreed upon a verdict and found the same in the following words to wit: Wm. the jury find the defendant guilty of unlawfully detaining the tenant and premises of the plaintiff as within described. Therefore it is considered by the Court that the plaintiff recover against the defendant possession of the tenement aforesaid and his costs by him in this behalf expended. And a writ of habeas facias possessionis is awarded, to cause the said plaintiff to have such possession.

The Court doth assign John D. Swell guardian of Frederick J. Dope, Martha A. Dope, George B. Dope, Wm. Dope and Mary M. Dope orphans of Anderson Dope dec'd. Whereupon he together with C. D. Bachman & Benjamin C. Walter, his securities (who justified on oath as to their sufficiency) entered into and acknowledged a bond in the penalty of fifteen hundred dollars conditioned according to law.
