

That Will and Testament of Henry James did come this day before
the courts of Robert M. Dolbe and Zachariah Doyle, one
of the subscribing witnesses thereto, and then and there
recorded. And on the motion of John Harris, the executor
named who made oath and together with Zachariah Doyle and
Matthew Harris his sureties, (who justified on or before
to their sufficiency) entered into bond acknowledging a debt
in the penalty of five hundred Dollars, conditioned according
to law. And estate is granted him for obtaining
1. probate of the said will in due form.

And that Matthew Harris, Zachariah Doyle and
James Harris being sworn for that purpose, do appear
all the goods or effects of Henry James dead &c.
may be produced to them and make due return of
the same.

And that George W. Weeks, Sheriff of this County take
into his hands the undivided estate of W. W. James
dead by the last will of Benj. F. Strong, and administer
the same according to law.

And that James J. Darden, Richard J. Darden and
David Hewitt Executors of Richard Darden dec'd.
be authorized to proceed in the State Bank of Virginia,
North Carolina, Georgia or any other State of the Southern
Confederacy, of that sum of five thousand dollars of the
assets of the said dec'd.

On the Application of Joseph J. Harris to establish a ferry
across Blackwater River at Croaker's Bridge. It is
ordered that James G. Jones, Wm. St. Lawrence & D. L. Dolbe
one of the Commissioners of roads of this County
view the said place and upon each report their opinion whether
or no public convenience will result from the proposed ferry
with their reasons for such opinion.

And that George W. Weeks, Sheriff of this County take into
his hands the estate of Madison Broadshaw dec'd
to be administered according to law.

And that the Sheriff of this County summon all
the acting Justices of this County to the next Session
of the Court to take into consideration the propriety
of establishing a ferry across Blackwater River
at Croaker's Bridge.
