

with security. Whereupon the said Merit J. Davis appears in Court and acknowledges due execution of the judgment, and he being heard it is ordered that the said Merit J. Davis execute a new bond in the penalty of Thirty Thousand Dollars with good security for his due and faithful administration of the estate of Madison J. Davis dec'd or his power and authority as administrator as aforesaid and annulled, and thereupon the said Merit J. Davis is directed to execute a new bond in the penalty and with security as aforesaid, it is ordered that his powers as administrator as aforesaid be revoked and annulled. And the motion of Eliza V. Davis who made oath as to the amount of her damages, and entered into a bond in the penalty of her damages, and condemned according to law with Orris J. Davis, and W. G. Williams her sureties thereon, who also made oath as to their sufficiency and which said bond acknowledged by the obligee theron, is annexed to the certificate is granted the said Eliza V. Davis, claiming letters of administration de bonorum on the estate of the said Madison J. Davis dec'd (the value of the estate being declared to be the sum of one thousand dollars) in due form. A stamp of the U.S. internal revenue to the amount of One Dollar being affixed hereto, as also one of the same amount on the bond aforesaid.

Ordered that John B. Davis, George Lain, Eli Davis and Joseph Gardner, or any three of them, being sworn for the purpose do appraise all the goods or chattels of Madison J. Davis dec'd that may be produced to them, and return the appraisement under their hands to the Clerk of this Court.

Ordered that the hands of Coleman Hines, Wiley Griffin, John Cook, Hormann Howl and James S. Bowden be transferred to the road over which the said James S. Bowden is Surveyor.
