 report and is in the words following In Presence to an
 order of the county court of Southampton bearing
 12 day of April 1753. We the subscribers have allotted
 and set apart the dower of Anne the wife of William Joyner
 his late widow's parcel of Bly Bly land in the lands of the
 said Bly as follows. That is to say beginning at a place in
 the express swamp thence by a line of marked trees to a mulberry
 in the yard between two houses thence by a line of marked
 trees to a pine in the side of a branch and up the various
 courses of the run of that branch to the line of the whole
 tract and along that line to the express swamp aforesaid
 down the various courses of the run of the said swamp to
 the beginning. and also have allotted & set apart the dower
 of the said Anne in the slaves late belonging to the said Bly
 as follows That the heir at law of the said Bly or his
 guardian do pay or cause to be paid unto the said Anne one
 third part of the fine of negroes Tom and Kings of the
 slaves that the said Bly did purloin off during the natural
 life of her the said Anne given under our hands this 8 day
 of April 1753.
