Whereupon it is ordered that the treasurer pay the S. Arthur Vick the sum of £45. 18. for the S. bridge

An Indenture of settlement between Ambrose Wiggard & Lucretia his wife of the one part & Joshua Short of the other part together with a receipt thereon endorsed were proved by the oaths of Ben Lewis James Martin & Amos Harris the witnesses thereto and ordered to be recorded And Lucretia the wife of the S. Ambrose personally appeared in court & being first privately examined as the law direct voluntarily relinquished her right of dower in the estate conveyed by the said indenture

On the motion of Francis Rowe a witness for James Vick agt William Agar it is ordered that the said Vick pay him seventy five pounds of tobacco for three days attendance on this court according to Law

On the motion of Thomas Chappell James Chappell & Arthur Jones witnesses for William Agar &c at the suit of James Vick it is ordered that the said Agar pay them respectively seventy five pounds of tobacco for three days attendance each on this Court according to Law

Ordered that Henry Taylor take the list of litchables in the room of James Ridley, James Ridley in the room of James Jones, Wm. Shunt in the room of Wm. Perion & that the list be continued as the last Year

On the motion of Wm. ^{agting to Wm. Agar & J. Vick} Simmons it is ordered that the S. Agar pay him seventy five pounds of nut tobacco for three days attendance on this Court according to Law

Ordered that the Court be adjourned till the court in court
