a half which we conceive to be of little or no conse-  
quence we do report that the covering plank which  
by the original agreement was to have been put  
on with 20 nails is nail'd on with 30 nails &  
moreover we do report the inside is ciild with  
plank and nail'd at six inches distance with  
30 nails by direction of the court since the under-  
taking we do hereby certify that the said  
prison was undertaken by the above named Mr.  
Peters for Ninch twopounds seven shillings &

sum of Ninch two pounds seventeen shillings &  
six pence for building of a prison
