The persons afformented to let the repairs of Appomattox bridge this day made their  
affit in the following words to wit. In Obedience to an order of Southampton county  
court neither subscribers have let the repairs of the lower Appomattox bridge to John  
Peters for the sum of two thousand four hundred pounds, which we find to be  
completed agreeable to the terms of letting Given under our hands this 14<sup>th</sup> day  
of June 1781 John <sup>be</sup> Cobb Benjamin Buffin. Whereupon it is ordered that  
the treasurer of this county pay unto the said John Peters the undertaker the said  
sum of Two thousand four hundred pounds for the same and account thereof  
with the court.

The last will and testament of Henry Taylor deceased with a codicil thereto annexed  
was presented in court by Etheldred Taylor and Daniel Fisher the executors therein  
named, proved by the oaths of Mary Mason Taylor and Robert Taylor two of the  
witnesses thereto and ordered to be recorded. And on the motion of the said execu-  
tors who made oath according to law certificate is granted them for obtaining a bo-  
nd thereof in due form giving security. Whereupon the said Etheldred Taylor  
and Daniel Fisher with John Taylor and Samuel Tello their securities entered  
into and acknowledged their bond in the penalty of Two millions of pounds for the  
said executors due and faithfull administration on the estate of the said decedent  
and performance of his will.

The last will and testament of Thomas Corritt deceased was presented in court by  
Elizabeth Corritt and Thomas Corritt the executors therein named, proved by the  
oaths of John Chitty and John Gilliam two of the witnesses thereto and ordered  
to be recorded. (The executors having time allowed them till the next court to  
qualify and give bond.)

Ordered that John Gilliam, Titus Barr, John Chitty and Joseph Gilliam or  
any three of them being first sworn before a justice of the peace for this  
county do appraise in current money the slaves if any and personal estate  
of Thomas Corritt deceased and return the appraisement to the next court.

The last will and testament of Charles Woodard deceased was proved by the oaths  
of John Peagor and Robert Speed two of the witnesses thereto and ordered to  
be recorded. (The executors having time allowed them till the next court to  
qualify.)

Ordered that George Washington, John Pyle, John Rodger and Benjamin Waller  
or any three of them being first sworn before a justice of the peace for this  
county do appraise in current money the slaves if any and personal estate of  
Charles Woodard deceased and return the appraisement to the next court.

An indenture of ffrements between James Brown of the one part and  
Benjamin Gray of the other part and the right claim endorsed were ad-  
vised by the said James Brown and ordered to be recorded.
