

The persons appointed to let the repairs of Appamoosee bridge this day made their report in the following words to wit. In obedience to an order of Southampton county court we the subscribers have let the repairs of the lower Appamoosee bridge to John Peters for the sum of two thousand four hundred pounds, which we find to be completed agreeable to the terms of letting given under our hands this 14th day of June 1781. John ^{his} Hobbs. Benjamin Ruffin. Whereupon it is ordered that the treasurer of this county pay unto the said John Peters the undertaker the said sum of Two thousand four hundred pounds for the same and account thereof with the court.

The last will and testament of Henry Taylor dead with a codicil thereto annexed were presented in court by Etheldred Taylor and Daniel Fisher the executors therein named, proved by the oaths of Mary Mason Taylor and Robert Taylor two of the witnesses thereto and ordered to be recorded. And on the motion of the said executors who made oath according to law certificate is granted them for obtaining a probat thereof in due form giving security. Whereupon the said Etheldred Taylor and Daniel Fisher with John Taylor and Samuel Tello their securities entered into and acknowledged their bond in the penalty of Two millions of pounds for the said executors due and faithful administration on the estate of the said decedent and performance of his will.

The last will and testament of Thomas Everitt dead was presented in court by Elizabeth Everitt and Thomas Everitt the executors therein named, proved by the oaths of John Chitty and John Gilliam two of the witnesses thereto and ordered to be recorded. (The executors having time allowed them till the next court to qualify and give bond.)

Ordered that John Gilliam, Titus Carr, John Chitty and Joseph Gilliam or any three of them being first sworn before a justice of the peace for this county do appraise in current money the slaves if any and personal estate of Thomas Everitt dead and return the appraisement to the next court.

The last will and testament of Charles Woodard dead was proved by the oaths of John Ridger and Robert Speed two of the witnesses thereto and ordered to be recorded. (The executors having time allowed them till the next court to qualify.)

Ordered that George Washington, John Pope, John Ridger and Benjamin Waller or any three of them being first sworn before a justice of the peace for this county do appraise in current money the slaves if any and personal estate of Charles Woodard dead and return the appraisement to the next court.

An indenture of feoffments between James Brown of the one part and Benjamin Gray of the other part and the receipt thereon endorsed were acknowledged by the said James Brown and ordered to be recorded.
