

445 At a Court of Sessions held for the County of Southampton at the Court house on
Thursday the 15th day of November 1788

Thomas Edwards, foreman, William Wright, Arthur Applewhite, Mr. Powell,
Went Jones, Timothy Atkinson, Levi Laver, Henry Branch, Thomas Griffin, Thomas
Lewis, Benjamin Black, Edmund Roman, Benjamin Williams, Henry Britton,
James Barnes, & John Rocher were sworn a grand jury of inquests on the body
of this County and having received their charge were sent out of Court and after
some time returned and presented as follows. We the grand jury make the following
presentments to wit, the surveyor of the road (commonly called the fish road) leading
from North (parsonage) to Barnes stone for not keeping the same in repair, the
surveyor of the road leading from Mr. Wicks stone to the old angle in a chappell for not
keeping the same in repair, the surveyor of the road leading from William Wrights
to the road that leads to Taylors for not keeping the same in repair, the surveyor
of the road leading from Giffords bridge to Dicks swamp for not keeping the
same in repair, signed Thomas Edwards foreman, and the said grand jury having
promised all such matters as came to their knowledge were discharged

Ordered that process issue against the several persons shewing presented by the grand
jury to cause them to appear at the Court to answer the presentments against them
respectively

This day came the attorney for the Commonwealth and the defendant appearing
and he made in his own defence our Considerations whereof it is ordered that the said
Thomas Wood find security for his good behaviour for the space of twelve months
from this date himself in the sum of one hundred pounds, and two securities in
the sum of Fifty pounds each and in default thereof stand committed to the
Custody of the sheriff. Whereupon the said Thomas Wood with Henry Broadshaw &
and Henry Onge gave his securities, interdicts and acknowledged them to be
bound to the Commonwealth the said Thomas Wood in the sum of one hundred
pounds and the securities in the sum of fifty pounds each of their respective lands and
