

was drawn by Nathan Edwards Son of John Edwards deceased being his proportionable part of the lands of his deceased father after receiving from James Brookes law No 3 the sum of 500 p. cents and William Edwards deceased left the sum of 25 44 cents and from Peterson Edwards left No 2 the sum of 10 p. 49 cents which together sums were 57.50 which his deceased father after receiving at a future day an equal division of the same right along the winding line of lots No 5 and 7 to a new corner of lots No 5 & 7 and a new corner of his out bounds to a new corner made in lot No 7 and a new corner of Peterson Edwards and William Edwards and others along the winding line of lots No 5 & 7 valued at 75 p. cents for each making 100 p. 70 cents being left No 7 which was drawn by William Edwards Son of John Edwards deceased being his proportionable part of the lands of his deceased father after paying to Nathan Edwards left No 1 the sum of 40 p. 44 which sums deducted from 100 p. 70 cents leaves 106 p. 26 cents his proportion of the lands of his deceased father after receiving above future day and equal division in the same right of his mother

Charles Deering at a lot a new corner made in the corner field being a corner of lots No 5 & 7 and 8 thence along the winding line of lots No 7 and 8 to a new corner made in lot No 7 and 8 in the old bounds of No 7 thence and they along the out bounds to other swamps called the Little Swamp thence along that Swamp the various corners then to a new corner made in lot No 6 and 5 and thence along the winding line of lots No 6 and 5 to the first Station containing 19 1/2 Acres valued at 10 Dollars 1/2 above amounting to 117 Dollars being left No 8 which lot was drawn by Peterson Edwards Son and heir of John Edwards deceased being his proportionable part of the lands of his deceased father after paying to Nathan Edwards left No 1 the sum of 10 p. 49 cents which sums deducted from 107 dollars leaves 106 p. 26 cents his full proportion of the lands of his deceased father after receiving at a future day and equal division in the same right which was assigned to Edwards now and relief of John Edwards deceased for life then quieted one house this 20 day of March 1815. The Persons appointed by a former Decree of this Court to view the premises where a road is proposed to be turned by John Corbett. This day make their report in the words and figures following to wit. Mr William Joyner, John Turner and Henry Doy all being sworn to view the road of John Corbett adjacently to an acre of the lands of John Corbett to be directed having been the Court 1815 we the undersigned have met according to appointment. On the road near Mr John Corbett and have very specially viewed the circumstances and inconveniences attending the turning the said road in a direct line to the best of our judgment that in turning the road the Public at large will be benefited in the distance that we think the new road is a great benefit to the nearest and as to the special benefit of John Corbett himself as an individual, we believe that it will save him nearly 1000 p. dollars or at least 1000 Dollars of fence and besides that as it respects the situation of his Plantation by turning the road it certainly will be a very great addition in the looks of this plantation it makes more convenient with respect to the situation of his Houses and in planting his orchards. And as it respects the inconvenience of the new road we believe that the new road will not be so inconvenient as the old one and finally as good as the old one it is not exactly as good
