

The Persons appointed by a former order of this Court to Report the convenience
is inconvenient that will result as well to the Publick as to individuals if a road
is opened from the Penny Ridge Road at Arthur Bowring to the Black water
road and black creek meeting house. This day meet them report in the words
and agree following to M^r Agarwala to an order of the County Court
of Southampton to be directed. we the magistrates held on the 9th day of
July 1816, Viewed the Situation of the opening a road from the Penny ridge
road at Arthur Bowring to the black water road and black creek meeting
house, we hardly dare that we have impartially viewed the convenience
and inconveniences attending the same, and are as fully of the opinion
that the inconvenience will very much result to the good of the People as
large, we think that the opening of said road will not injure individual
but very little. It will bear the road on Arthur Bowring, if the road
should be extended, of any other Person, the road is opened may be
very convenient, in a number of instances, it will run through the lands
of James Jones, James Dawson and Peter Dawson, Nelson Wade, James
Thomson, Henry Sykes, Jeremiah Sykes, and Arthur Bowring and if
extended so through the lands of Benjamin Griffin, John Bradshaw,
Micajah Griffin, John Carpenter, Samuel Bennett and Thomas Bowring
and by this extension we are fully of opinion that it will be one of the
most convenient roads, for the traffic of the same that we have in
this County, or at least so much so. The situation of the said road
will be from the Penny Ridge road at Arthur Bowring down to the same
hill road at Browns Ferry. Given under our hands the 15th of July 1816
"James Jones, William Sykes," Whereupon His order set the
Several Persons charged whose lands the said road is proposed to be opened
be Summoned to the next Court to have cause if any they can why the said
road should not be opened as proposed.

The persons appointed by a former order of this Court to view and
report the practicability of building a bridge across Plotterway River near
Brown's Ferry this day met them report in the words following to M^r
"In Obedience to an order of the worshipful The County Court of
Southampton, We have examined the water of near Brown's Ferry and
it is our opinion that a Bridge may be Built about 40 or 50 feet
below the said Ferry, without any difficulty, as it respects the fall
of the water and navigation of the river. Given under our hands the 19th of
July of August 1816, Richard Dillard, Clement Rachelle, William Phillips,
J. Barnard — which was ordered to be Recorded,

Ordered that the Justices of the Peace of this County be Summoned to the
next Court, by the Sheriff to 5^o clock whether or not a bridge shall be erected
near Brown's Ferry agreeable to the Commissioners report therof —

Ordered that the master Commissioner, as Examiner Rate and Settle the account
of Benjamin Bradshaw's marshalsea on the estate late Bradshaw after his
William Bradshaw deceased, and make a report thereof to the Court.
