

Mildred Johnson widow and relict of Pelly Johnson dec'd

The Commissioners appointed under an interlocutory decree formerly made in this cause to appraise the complainant her dower in the lands of her deceased husband Pelly Johnson this day made the following report to wit: "Agreeable to an order of the County Court of Southampton to us directed bearing date Nov^r. Court 1819 the undersigned have gone on the lands of Pelly Johnson dec'd attended with the County Surveyor as by the order we were required and have surveyed the same and find there to be in the house tract 68 Acres and the other tract 66 Acres making in all 134 Acres. We have further proceeded to appraise and set apart to the Widow of the said dec'd her one third part of the said lands in manner and form following to wit: In the house tract 26 Acres and bounded as follows Beginning at a white oak in the side of the road a new Cr. made in the meadows down thence N 79° W 36 poles to a small branch, thence along the branch to J. M. Ballards Mill pond: thence down S. Mill pond to the mouth of another small branch, thence up that branch to a cypress a new Cr. made in S. branch, thence along a new marked line running between the dwelling house and kitchen to the first Station, containing 26 Acres being her one third part of S. House tract of land for life - Also the bounds of the dower of the other tract are bounded as follows to wit: Beginning at a red oak a new Cr. in the dower line and in Samuel Corbills line thence N 57° W 74 poles to a pine a Cr. of Samuel Corbills thence N 31° E 30 poles to a small gum a new Cr. made in the dower and Jonathan Luters line; thence along a line of new marked trees S 30° E 80 poles to a pine a variation in the dower line thence S 15° W 22 poles to the first Station containing 22 Acres being the dower for life of the Widow of the S. dec'd. Given under our hands this 14th day of June 1820. Jonathan Luter, Wm. Jeyner, Sufe Sankford, John H. Chapman." Whereupon by consent of parties by their Attornies it is ordered that the said report in form aforesaid made be confirmed and the costs equally borne -

Jeyner in right of his wife Nancy during of her natural life one third part of the lands whereof John Fitzhugh died seized and possessed with to wit: The house tract beginning at a red oak a new corner made in the dower line standing out the Gate thence along the new line South 26° E 125 poles to a maple a corner of the dower in roses Swamp thence down the Swamp to dead Swamp a corner in Henry Parsons line thence thence N 43° W 138 poles to the road thence along the road N 55° E 24 poles thence N 27° E 84 poles to the first Station containing 83 Acres - Also one third

tract beginning at a pole to a pine a corner thence N 47° W 36 poles E 50 poles to a red oak trees S 26° E to the first off and appraise under life one third part of man Henry, Negro girl and old woman Gilly named Jacob Brown and Waller Lewis." Whereupon
