The Commissioners appointed by a former order of this Court to view and report the most eligible place for the bridge to cross the river at Jerusalem this day made their report which is ordered to be recorded and is in these words to wit: "The undersigned Commissioners by virtue of your order to them directed proceeded to examine the river at Jerusalem for the purpose of selecting a suitable site whereon to erect a bridge, and now beg leave to state that in the discharge of the duties therein assigned them they could come to no unity of opinion among themselves; they therefore as a proper alternative determined in view of their opinion to submit to the Court a statement of the facts upon which those opinions are founded and trust that will be deemed sufficient, believing, as they do that the Court when in possession of the facts, can with readiness draw correct conclusions impeded by the opinions of the Commissioners. As to the present location of the Bridge no comment will be made, presuming the Court are fully apprised of its advantages and disadvantages, should they thus apprised deem it necessary to change the location there are only two situations to which it can be removed consistent with public convenience. The first of these examined by the Commissioners is about 50 paces higher up the river, where the bottom is gone and about 8 or 10 feet water from one side to the other, and would require a bridge two arches longer than the old bridge, but these additional arches will only require posts five or six feet long, and will be planted on the river shore entirely clear of water, the western buttment will be on Lewis Fagunto land, and the Eastern adjoining the new work recently erected for the preservation of the river bank, immediately above the Fall, the new passing between the Fall and Samuel Nicholsons lot (where there is a space of fifty feet) to main Street - The second and only remaining situation to which we think the attention of the Court should be directed is about 50 paces below the

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
