This day came the parties by their counsel and the Commissioners appointed under the interlocutory decree made in this cause at November Court 1832 to make division of the slaves belonging to the estate of Richard B. Kello deceased this day made their report which is ordered to be Recorded and is in these words to wit: "In conformity to the annexed decree, we the undersigned, Commissioners have proceeded to divide the slaves belonging to the estate of Richard B. Kello dec^d in the following manner, (Wife) We consider it worth \$50. to support Rob for life, and have valued Tom at \$50. which will make him worth nothing in valuation. Henry valued at \$350. Simon at \$400. Davy at \$425. Absolom at \$400. Addison at \$425. Everett at \$425. Jerry at \$400. Reuben at \$400. Oscar at \$200. (Considered infirm) Henry \$250. Isaac \$250. Alley and child Jacob at \$250. Evalina at \$250. Chaney \$200. Sally \$150. Amanda \$125. Army and two children Penelope and Simon at \$250. Nancy \$150. Fanny & child Joe \$275. Priscilla \$125. Abner \$75. and Nicholas \$50. making the sum of \$5825. taking off one third, say \$1941.66 for the widow for and during her natural life, and in order to make that sum we have allotted to her Rob & Tom at victuals and clothes, Simon, Davy, Isaac, Alley & child Jacob, Evalina, Chaney and Nancy as and for her dower. leaving the sum of \$3900 to be divided into six equal parts, which is done in the following manner Lot No. 1 Henry at \$350, Fanny & Joe at \$275 making \$625 which is one sixth part, lacking \$25 which is to be paid by Lot No. 4 and drawn by Charles Kello. Lot No. 2 contains Absolom at \$400. Amanda at \$125 & Priscilla at \$125 making \$650 and drawn by William Kello. Lot No. 3 Addison at \$425. Sally \$150. Abner at \$75 making \$650. and drawn by Samuel Kello. Lot No. 4 Everett at \$425. Henry \$250. making \$675 which is \$25 over his proportion, and is to pay over to Lot No. 1. and drawn by
