Simmons and John James be appointed Commissioners and three of whom may act - that they sell to the highest bidder (after advertising the time and place of sale for three weeks) the dower lands whereof Rebecca Simmons died seized upon a credit of twelve months, except enough to pay the costs of this decree which they are to receive on the day of sale, and that they take of the purchaser four bonds of equal amounts and assign one to Louisa Martin, one to Edwin Simmons, one to Benjamin Applewhite in right of his wife and the other to Joseph Drury in right of his wife. That they also divide the dower negroes into four equal parts according to value and allot one to Louisa Martin, one to E. Simmons, one to B. Applewhite in right of his wife and the other to Joseph Drury in right of his wife and report their proceedings to the Court in order to a final decree.

Wells for \$75.00 dated the 15 day of January 1836. due nine months after date. Or for \$1.40 paid August 15. 1832. Another bond executed by Richard C. Smith for \$11.35/100 dated and due 25 July 1830 and another executed by Anthony Holland for \$4.25/100 due 25 December 1835. which bonds are recorded and deposited by the Clerk of this Court subject to the further order of the Court.

The Commissioners appointed to act with Commissioners appointed by the County Court of Greenville in letting the repairs of Hales Bridge across Meherrin River, this day made their report which is ordered to be recorded and in these words to wit:
"We the Commissioners appointed by the County Court of Southampton to act jointly with the Commissioners appointed by the County Court of Greenville, in letting the repairs of Hales Bridge do hereby make the following report. VIZ That after making the necessary examination of the situation of that bridge we advertised the letting of such repairs as we deemed necessary, and Hewitt Drow became the contractor for the sum of one hundred and eighty seven dollars with a deduction of five dollars for old timber sold to John A. Person, and after said contract which was to be completed by the 15th Nov. One of the bridge arches sustained considerable damage by a freshet, and it appearing to the Commissioners that a new arch was absolutely necessary made an additional contract with the said Hewitt Drow to put up the new arch for the sum of sixty four dollars. Both of the contracts have been completed by said Drow and the bridge received by the 29th Nov. 1835.
