We found all the bonds to the legacies as well to be given by their receipts with the said bond to the children of Jesse Kitchin, as they are not inhabitants of the State and have not where they reside we bound their bond with this debt to the Court of Saml. W. Hines, Richard Hines, Henry M. Watts. On consideration thereof and consent of parties it is decreed and ordered that the sale and decision aforesaid be confirmed and from as aforesaid made be held firm and stable and binding between the parties
