Whereupon on the motion of the attorney for the Commonwealth and at appearing to the Court that the warrant summoning the Court for the trial of the prisoner is defective it is ordered that it be quashed and that the said Jane Artest be taken by the Sheriff before some Justice of the Peace of this County to be dealt with according to Law.

The Commissioners appointed by the interlocutory decree made in this cause at May Term 1836 to allot to Philo B. Myrick one third of the lands of which the said James Myrick died seized on specified and one third of the slaves of said decedent this day made a report which is ordered to lie on the bar for exceptions and is in these words to wit: "According to the aforesaid decree we the Commissioners have allotted to Philo B. Myrick a tract of land lying in Mahoning Town containing by estimation one hundred acres as being by consent of M^{rs} Myrick for her interest as dower in a tract of land which was sold belonging to the estate of James Myrick by order of a deed of trust called the Mahoning plantation. We have also allotted to her the following slaves namely Alexander and Mildred they having made \$35 over her portion we have put in her dower an old negro woman named Mary which we allotted the value of \$35 to keep her life time. Given under our hands this 6th day of Sept. 1836. C. B. Olcott Thos. J. Brown King Williams."
