

of all the circumstances of the case are unanimously of opinion that the prisoner is guilty of the offence aforesaid of which he stands charged, and it being demanded of him if any thing factitious he had or tenes to say why the Court should not now proceed to pronounce judgment against him according to law, and nothing being offered or alleged in delay of judgment, it is considered by the Court that the prisoner be hanged by the neck until he be dead - and that the Sheriff do execution of this judgment on Tuesday the 20th day of October next, at the usual place of execution, between the hours of 10 O'Clock in the morning and 3 O'Clock in the evening of the same day - And therupon the prisoner is remanded to jail. And the Court from all the circumstances of the case recommend to the Governor to commute the punishment of the prisoner to transportation. And that members of the Court value the said Dasy as follows: James Cobb at \$150. William A. Drake \$225. James Clayton \$200. Thomas Kirby \$200. Nathaniel Williams \$150 making the average value \$185.

Ordered that Mrs Francis Parker pay Daniel J. Douglas twenty five dollars for defending her slave Dasy charged with felony.

Jane A. Artist a free woman of colour who stands charged with feloniously opening the desk of John Drake at his residence in this County on Saturday the eleventh day of July last past and feloniously stealing and carrying away therefrom thirty five dollars in money bank notes and five dollars in Silver being the property of the said John Drake was set to the bar in custody of the keeper of the jail of this County. (The Court Summoned for her examination having failed to meet) and being duly arraigned pleaded Not guilty and therupon Sundry witnesses were sworn and examined and the prisoner was fully heard by Counsel. Upon consideration whereof and of all the circumstances of the case the Court are unanimously of opinion that the prisoner is guilty of grand larceny, and it being demanded of the prisoner if any thing he had or could say why the Court should not now proceed to pronounce judgment against her, and nothing being offered or alleged in delay of judgment it is considered by the Court that the said Jane Artist be imprisoned in the public jail and penitentiary house of this Commonwealth for the term of five years. And it is ordered that the Sheriff of this County do so soon as possible after the adjournment of this Court remove and safely convey the said Jane Artist from the jail of this County to the said public jail and penitentiary house thence to be kept imprisoned and treated in the manner directed by Law. And the Court doth certify that on the trial of the said Jane Artist nothing appeared either in aggravation or extenuation of the offence of the said Jane Artist. Nor did it appear before the examination of the said offence she was of bad or good character or that she had ever been convicted or tried for any felony or other infamous crime. And therupon the said Jane Artist is remanded to jail.

The registers of Robert Buck, Mary W. Buck and Martin Brown, free negroes, were examined and testified to be truly made.

Ordered that the Persons of the Poor and to George Whitfield Benjamin Turner aged eight or nine years, James Turner aged four years, both children of Hester Turner, free negro, and George Dorn aged one or two years, son of Betty Dorn according to law communting with the
