The said defendants being out of this Commonwealth and the plaintiff having procured against them an absent defendants in the mode provided by law and they still failing to appear and answer the bill and petition in the motion of the plaintiff by Counsel his bill is taken for confessed, as to the said defendants and this cause came on this day to be heard on the bill and exhibit filed, and was argued by Counsel: On consideration whereof the Court doth order, adjudge and decree that Joseph D. Whitehead (who is hereby appointed a Commissioner for this purpose) proceed to sell at public auction to the highest bidder, upon account of six months (except for enough to pay the costs of this suit and expenses of sale, which will be demanded in cash and which he will pay over to those entitled, the bank notes or paper of land debts in the County of Southampton and joint the lands of D. S. and M. C. Parrell and contain about one hundred and fourteen acres, be the same more or less, and use the bill mentioned after having advertised the time and place of sale at his own discretion, and given fifteen days notice thereof, by advertising posted up at the Courtroom door of Southampton County, and at two or more public places in said County, convenient to the place of sale. And after deducting the costs of suit and expenses of sale, he will divide the net amount of sales into five equal parts and take bonds with good security payable as follows to wit: One bond for one fifth payable to Edmund Cosby, one bond for one fifth payable to James Cosby, one bond for one fifth payable to Daniel Cosby, one bond for one fifth payable to Denny Cosby, and the remaining one fifth subdivide into three equal parts and take one bond for one third of one fifth payable to Mills Cosby, one bond for one third of one fifth payable to Miles Cosby, and one bond for one third of one fifth payable to John Cosby being the share to which each Cosby their father was entitled to, under the will of John Cosby the elder. And the said Commissioner will pay over the bonds to the parties respectively entitled. And make a deed to the purchaser on the said four without warranty. And make report to the Court in order to a final decree in the premises.
