The Commissioners in this cause this day made their report which is in these words to wit: "Agreeably to a decree of the County Court of Southampton dated April Term 1847, we the undersigned Commissioners in obedience to the requisitions of said decree, have laid off for Mildred Worrell widow of Jesse Worrell dec^d about twenty acres of land, including the dwelling houses as her dower in the tract of land of which her late husband died seised, which tract contains by estimation eighty eight acres. The said dower is bounded as follows to wit. Beginning at a pine in Miles Worrells line thence along a line of new marked trees a Northernly course to a pine, thence an Easterly course to a small black gum in said Miles Worrells line, thence along his line to the beginning. After describing the time and place of sale of the land as directed by the decree aforesaid, on the 3rd day of June 1847. We sold the same at public auction to the highest bidder subject to the widows dower and Miles Worrell became the purchaser for the sum of Eighty six dollars from which sum we have deducted Commissions four dollars and thirty cents for Lawyers fee five dollars and for clerks for two dollars and thirty eight cents making eleven dollars and sixty eight cents. which taken from eighty six dollars leaves a balance of seventy four dollars and thirty two cents. for which we have taken a bond from said Miles Worrell with James Worrell his surety due June 3rd 1848 and herewith return
