

At the Court house of the County of Southampton on the 2^d day of September 1826 James D. Bryant and One
 C. Pope Just. Justices of this County attended and constituted a Court for the trial of a complaint of A. Foster the
 Plaintiff against James Grinnell for unlawfully and against his tenant holding him out of possession of a certain
 Tenement containing by estimate one acre of land lying and being in the said County. Whereas it appearing
 that the defendant has been duly served with the warrant the Court proceeded to empanel a jury for the trial of
 the complaint, and James Bryant, George Bryant, William J. Davis, James B. Parrell, John T. Parrell, Dan. O.
 Blandford, David Turner, Nathan A. Thomas, Joseph W. Wood, Benjamin J. Davis, William Parrell, and William
 W. Mathews having been accordingly empanelled, they were charged on oath in the manner provided by the
 Statute, and the Justices admitted before them all legal evidence which was offered and the plaintiff was
 heard by Counsel, and the said jury after hearing the evidence and the argument of Counsel unanimously
 agreed upon a verdict and found the same in the following words to-wit: "We the jury find that the defend-
 ant did at the time of the execution of the complaint filed in this cause hold possession of the tenement
 therein mentioned against the consent of the plaintiff, that the defendant had not been held against the consent
 of the plaintiff for three years next before the execution of the complaint, and that the plaintiff has the
 right of possession of the tenement aforesaid. Therefore it is considered by the Court that the plaintiff
 is entitled against the defendant possession of the tenement aforesaid and his costs by him on this behalf
 expended. And a writ of habere facias possessionem is awarded to cause the said plaintiff have such
 possession."
