

Slaves severally as they were presented to us. This being done we proceeded them out among
to valuation into their lots. Upon a review of the lots thus partitioned out, we understood, and
several negroes were discovered by exchange best calculated to derive an uniform value.
In all cases the values of the slaves were accommodated so far as we considered we had the
power. During the progress of our work, we discovered a boy nearly blind, of meekness,
according to the wishes of the parties, we gave up this unfortunate boy to the widow, who
agreed to support him for life. We also found an old woman, too infirm to be sold,
we determined to allow \$100.00 for her support. We therefore placed her in one of the lots
making a corresponding deduction from value of that lot. By this means the business
will be transacted equally by all. Having being these infant slaves, we determined to consider it
these lots. Value of the negro slaves
