

Ordered that the Treasurer of Southampton County out of the County levy, pay to Jos. H. Crumpler the sum of ninety seven dollars and twenty cents the amount of his account for repairs of Ferry house at Manns Ferry.

St. Vaughan Constable, who returned that he had attached Forty seven Cords of wood and about four hundred pounds of oats.

This day came the plaintiffs by their attorney and the Defendant though solemnly called came not, it is therefore considered by Court that the plaintiffs recover against the Defendant sixty seven dollars and fourteen cents the amount of their claim proved to be just with legal interest thereon from the first day of February 1874, till paid, and their costs in this behalf expended - and it is ordered that the Constable make sale of the effects attached as aforesaid according to law and apply the moneys arising from such sale or so much thereof as is necessary to the satisfaction of the plaintiffs judgment, and the surplus if any return to the Defendant and return account of said sale Court.

Corflect & Co. having made complaint before a Justice of the Peace of this County that William Peterson is justly indebted to them in the sum of twenty eight dollars and five cents, which became payable on the 24th day of June 1874, and that the said William Peterson intends to remove his effects out of this State so that there will probably not be therein sufficient effects to satisfy said claim, when judgment is obtained thereon, should only the ordinary process of law be used to obtain such judgment, and the said Justice having issued an attachment against the estate of the said William Peterson directed to F. St. Vaughan Constable, who returned that he had attached William Peterson's interest in his cotton and corn crops in Southampton County.

This day came the plaintiffs by their attorney and the Defendant though solemnly called came not, and for reasons appearing to the Court this case is continued until the 1st day of the next term.
