Barnett, who have been Elected Justices of the Peace in the Magisterial District of Kansas at the Election held on the 27th day of May 1875, by the qualified Voters thereof, for the term of two years commencing on the 1st day of July 1875, and to continue to discharge the duties of their Office, after their terms expire, until their Successors shall have qualified, this day appeared in Court, and qualified, by taking the Oaths of Office, required by law?

Geo. M. Hughes and R. T. Parkman, who have been Elected Justices of the Peace in the Magisterial District of Davenport, at the Election held on the 27th day of May 1875, by the qualified Voters thereof, for the term of two years commencing on the 1st day of July 1875, and to continue to discharge the duties of their Office, after their terms expire until their Successors shall have qualified, this day appeared in Court, and qualified, by taking the Oaths of Office required by law?

William W. Briggs who was on the 27th day of May 1875, duly elected Sheriff of the County of Southampton by the qualified Voters thereof to serve as such for the term of four years, commencing on the first day of July 1875, and after the said term of Office shall have expired until his Successor is qualified to enter upon the discharge of the duties of said Office, this day appeared in Court, and together with William Madson, Joseph R. Briggs and James E. Sebrell his Sureties, entered into and acknowledged a bond for the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars, conditioned according to law, which bond is ordered to be recorded. And thereupon the said Briggs took the several Oaths required by law?

James E. Sebrell, who was on the 27th day of May 1875, duly elected by the qualified Voters of the County of Southampton, Treasurer thereof, to serve as such for the term of four years commencing on the first day of July 1875, and after the said term of Office shall have expired until his Successor is qualified to enter upon the discharge of the duties of said Office, this day appeared in Court and together with John A. Sebrell, Wm. A. Reed, Wm. M. Benton, Wm. A. Sebrell, R. W. Sebrell, Wm. W. Corby, Wm. W. Briggs, Luther R. Edwards, Geo. W. Vick, Benjamin E. Worrell and Henry M. Butler, his Sureties, (who justified on Oath as to their Sufficiency) entered into and acknowledged a bond in the sum of Forty Thousand Dollars, conditioned according to law, which bond is ordered to be recorded. And thereupon the said James E. Sebrell took the several Oaths required by law.
