This Indenture made the 14th day of February in the year of our Lord 1805 Between Charles Briggs William Briggs and Henry Briggs Commissioners appointed by the Mississippi Court of Chancery, more of the Covenants date 21st day of February 1803 of the parish of Natchez and County of Stamps of the one part and Samuel Bond of the other part. Witnesseth that the Commissioners aforesaid for and in consideration of the sum of one hundred and sixty Six pounds one Shilling current Money of Virginia to them in hand paid by the said Charles Briggs and delivery of them present the receipt whereof the Commissioners aforesaid having before them and hath granted bargain and sold unto the said Samuel Bond and by these presents hath granted bargain and sold unto the said Samuel Bond of the one part unto the said Samuel Bond of the other part a parcel of Land containing by Estimation two hundred and one or less which said land formerly belonging to William Bond who promised to deed and is hereunto as follows (to wit) Beginning at a pine stump standing near the South side of The Hunting road thence down the road to abutts Oak across of Sarah Woods line thence along her line to a pine stump standing in Thomas Gray line thence an about to corner Hill Swamp thence up the said Swamp to the Mouth of the Pond Mill Swamp thence up the said Mill Swamp to abutts from standing on the said Swamp, about twenty five or thirty paces below the Mill thence as straight line to the beginning to John Bond to hold the aforesaid land and premises thence before mentioned unto to be bargain and sold and every part and parcel thereof unto the use of the said Samuel Bond his heirs and assigns forever and for the only part now and hereof of him the said Samuel Bond his heirs and assigns forever and the said Commissioners for themselves and their heirs and
