

Bradley to G.

I know all men by these presents that I James Bradley of the County of Hallycock and State of North Carolina for divers good causes and considerations me there unto moving, but more especially for the consideration of the sum of five shillings to me in hand paid by James Gee, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, have granted bargained and sold and by these presents do grant, bargain and sell unto the said James Gee his heirs and assigns forever, one negro woman called Werry with her future increase, to have and to hold the said negro woman Werry with her future increase as of now and unto the said James Gee his heirs and assigns to the only proper uses and behoof of him the said James Gee his heirs and assigns forever and I the said James Bradley for myself, my heirs, executors & administrators warrant and defend the title of the aforesaid negro woman Werry with her future increase unto the said James Gee his heirs & assigns, against the claim & demand of all persons whatsoever - In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal this 9th day of February 1805

This Indenture made the 15th day of September in the year 1805
between George Guiley and Lucy his wife of the one part and John Guiley of the
other part, Ottagatch, that the said George Guiley and Lucy his wife for and in
consideration of the sum of one hundred & twenty five pounds to them in hand paid
by the said John Guiley the receipt whereof the said George Guiley and Lucy his
wife with her by acknowledging & hath granted, bargained and sold and by these presents
doth grant, bargain and sell, also in suffice to confirm unto the said Mr. Guiley
his heirs & assigns forever one certain tract of land containing by estimation
one hundred & forty five acres more or less, and bounded as follows, Beginning in
the run of the Creek, to wmp a corner of Pidgeon Creek, & running thence along
thence along a line of marked trees to a small old oak a corner of said Creek
