A Description of slaves brought into Virginia from North Carolina by Samue Blount the same being acquired by marriage One negro woman named Judy of a yellowish complexion about twenty six years of age Caroline a girl of yellow complexion about five years of age, Martha a girl of yellow complexion about three years of age Mary a girl of yellow complexion about one year of age Rebecca a mulatto girl about one year of age This day Samue Blount personally appeared before me a justice of the peace for the county of Southampton and made oath that the above statement is a true description of the slaves which he hath brought into the Commonwealth that he acquired the same by marriage in North Carolina and that
