Kinsel tract running down the said branch to a pine
that parts Buxton Barnes tract and the said Kinsel
tract thence running a strait course to three black gums
in a small branch thence running down the said branch
to Gee mill pond thence up the said pond to Edmund
Turner's line in the mouth of a small branch thence up
the said branch to a pine a corner of Edmund Turner's land
running thence a strait course to a red or white oak that parts
Benjamin Turner's tract and the said Kinsel tract
running thence to a shrub oak in the corn field running thence
to Cain's meadow and up the said meadow to the beginning
to have and to hold the aforesaid tract or parcel of land
containing by estimation three hundred and sixty three acres
more or less with the appurtenances unto the said Samuel
Turner his heirs and assigns to the only proper uses and
benefit of him the said Samuel Turner his heirs forever
Under this restriction that the said Benjamin Turner
gent shall have the liberty to till what cleared land he
has cleared since he has had possession of the said tract
of land with the assistance of timber where he may think
proper upon the said land his life also a house of Master
