Whereas Benjamin Edwards Broom and Mary
 Mason his wife, of the County of Surry, by their Deed bearing
 date the twelfth seventh day of August in the year of Christ
 and this was and eight hundred and eight, did bargain, sell and convey
 unto Edward Faulcon of the said County, and his heirs a certain
 tract of land and a Crist mill situate, lying and being in
 the County of Southampton, which was devised to the said Mary
 Mason and Broom and their heirs by her brother Robert Taylor, late
 of the said County of Southampton, together with all and sin-
 gular the appurtenances thereto belonging, to have and to hold
 unto the said Mary and Broom his heirs and assigns, to
 and for the uses, trusts, intents and purposes therein mentioned or
 declared, that is to say, to the use and behoof of the said Benjamin
 E. Broom and Mary Mason his wife and the survivor of them,
 for and during their natural lives, without impeachment of
 or for any manner of Waste. And from and after the decease
 of the said Benjamin and Mary, then to the use and behoof
 of William St. Broom the youngest son of the said Benjamin
