This Indenture made this 12th day of February in the year of our Lord Christ one thousand eight hundred and nineteenth. Between Samuel Denson of the County of Southampton and parish of Nettonay of the one part and Lemuel Stanton of the same County and parish of the other part Witnesseth that the said Samuel Denson for and in consideration of the sum of one thousand and fifty Dollars current money of Virginia to him in hand paid by the said Lemuel Stanton the receipt whereof the said Samuel Denson doth acknowledge himself fully and amply satisfied and paid, hath granted, bargained, sold, aliened, conveyed and confirmed, and they their heirs doth grant, bargain and sell unto the said Lemuel Stanton his heirs and assigns forever all his undivided one half part of the lands of Joseph Denson deceased being his full right and part in all the lands aforesaid and hereunto appurtenances to wit Beginning at a white oak a c. in Charles M. Ballard's line here standing on the side of the road leading from Green Hill to Black water bridge, thence up the said road or path to a pine a c. of Joseph M. Ballard standing at the point
