This Indenture made this fourteenth day of June one thousand eight hundred and twenty five between Thomas Ebellamy and Edward
Brooks of the County of Southampton on the part and Edward Bellamy of the same County of the other part witnesseth that the said Thomas
Ebellamy and Nancy his wife for and consideration of the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars lawful money of Virginia
to him on hand paid him grants bargains and sold by this present as good grant bargains and sold unto the said Edward
Bellamy and his heirs forever all that tract of land in the County of Southampton of which the said Thomas Ebellamy
July 11th 1825 purchased of George Cobb containing two hundred acres and a half acres to be known more by reference to thence
said the boundaries will fully appear and run bounded by the lands of the said Edward Bellamy on the west part
and New Worrell on the south and by the mean tree of the stream called Swamp on the East it contains to the best of
knowledge and belief of the subscriber two hundred and forty acres more or less and the said Edward Bellamy to the west
