This Indenture made this Twenty fourth day of March Eighteen Hundred & Twenty seven between John McGlammie and Polly his wife of Southampton County of the one part and Gregory Rowlings of the said County of the other part. Witnesseth that the said John McGlammie for and in consideration of the sum of Two Hundred and Forty Dollars Current money Virginia to him in hand paid at or before the sealing & delivery of these presents the receipt whereof he doth hereby acknowledge hath bargain sold aliened and confirmed and by these presents doth grant bargain sell and confirm unto the said Gregory Rowlings his heirs and assigns forever one certain Tract or parcel of Land lying and being in the said County of Southampton containing sixty acres by survey beginning at a maple in the indigo Pond on the right Branch a mens made corner between John McGlammie and Gregory Rowlings thence down the various courses of said Branch to the road thence up the road to a red oak thence S 57. W 26 poles to a spanish oak S 55. W. 5. 6 poles to a pine S 57. W 66. 22 poles to a Pine S 62. W 16. 7 poles to a gum stump in a branch thence N 9. W. 21. 2 poles to a gum at the road in said Branch N 19. 30. W 11. 7 poles to a pine N 21. W 16 poles N 33. W 11 poles N 12. W 11 poles N 19. W 11 poles to a Black Gum a mens made corner between John McGlammie and Gregory Rowlings thence N 77. E 15. 7 poles to the maple at the beginning. Together with all woods waters watercourses profits and advantages whatsoever thereto belonging or appertaining with the reversions and remainments thereof. To have and to hold the said Tract or parcel of Land unto the said Gregory Rowlings his heirs and assigns forever and the said John McGlammie his heirs the aforesaid premises with its appurtenances to the said Gregory Rowlings his heirs & assigns well warrant and forever defend.
