This Indenture made this 21<sup>st</sup> day of November 1827 between John Pope first part defendant  
the second part and John Tuck of the third part all of the County of Southampton and State of  
Virginia W<sup>t</sup> M<sup>r</sup> respectful that whereas before he became security for the said John Pope William  
Edwards for the sum of fifty dollars in the year 1828 also for owing his note to John Thomas a sum  
of twenty five dollars for twenty two dollars and 75 cents of which was due in the year of 1826  
which was due by notes the payment of which the said John Pope is willing and desirous  
to pay over to the said John Tuck which the said John Thomas and I for John Pope his  
consideration of the promised payment of the sum of one dollar to him in hand paid by the said John  
Tuck in receipt whereof he by acknowledgment doth grant and bargains sold and by these  
presente doth grant buy and will sell unto the said John Tuck his heirs and assigns the  
following property (hereinafter called) One feather bed <sup>and</sup> furniture one Spinning wheel in full ditto one pine  
chest one pine Table two Sons and pigs and the following toys one cloth cover all my kitchen  
furniture one Cartons wheels one apple tree 18 inches barrel all my farmy tools & all my  
corn and fodder to have and to hold the aforesaid property unto him and his  
heirs and assigns forever in trust nevertheless should the said John Pope to the well and truly pay the  
aforesaid debt interest and costs unto the aforesaid John Pope or John Tuck then this Indenture to  
be void otherwise it shall and may be lawful for the aforesaid John Tuck to use for his use for his day the  
aforesaid property and sell sufficiently thereof to pay the debt interest and costs aforesaid and the balance  
pay over to the said John Pope his heirs forever. In witness whereof the parts to this

Jane Belaud for and in consideration of the sum of fifty five dollars and 75/100 or such sum  
sums due from the said Jane Belaud to the said Joseph J. Clement by bond bearing date the 15<sup>th</sup> day of  
June one thousand eight hundred and forty eight as well as all other monies which may become  
owing from the said Jane Belaud to the said Joseph J. Clement by means of any manner whatsoever  
debt or expense what so ever as also for and in consideration of one dollar to her in hand paid  
by the said Willlie Francis who receipt whereof <sup>the said Willlie Francis</sup> doth hereby acknowledge much grained bargains  
two lots and by these presents doth hereby grant bargain and sell convey and make over  
unto the said Willlie Francis and his heirs forever all his right and interest  
in the following property to wit a certain tract or parcel of land situated in the said County  
of Southampton containing one hundred & eleven acres more or less it being the same  
on which she the said Jane Belaud at present resides also one negro man named  
Henry one negro woman named Louisa Mrs. Sorrell married two full blooded Negroes &  
furthermore household and kitchen furniture plantation interests &c stock of cattle  
& crop also crop of all kind now growing belonging to her the said Jane Belaud
