This Indenture made and entered into this fourth day of April in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty nine between John Druery of the County of Southampton and State of Virginia of the one part and Samuel Druery of the said County and State of the other part Witnesseth that for and in consideration of the sum of Fifty dollars the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged by the said John Druery hath grant bargain and by their presents do grant bargain sell and confirm unto the said Samuel Druery one certain tract or parcel of land lying in the said County and part of the tract of land which the said John Druery bought of James B. Slade commencing at a post oak near the road from thence to a post oak a few crabs from thence to a forked gum in a branch from thence through an old field where there are several trees chopped as long maps to a pine in edge of old field from thence to a gum from thence to a dogwood from thence to a gum from thence to a stone pine from thence to a dogwood from thence to a gum from thence to a large pine which stands in the edge of a branch (which course from the oak to the pine is near a south direction) from the said pine near a north corner back along the line formerly between the said parties to Samuel Druery's land up the said line a west corner to the beginning estimated at twelve acres it to be the same more or less with all the benefits and advantage thenceunto belonging to have and to hold unto the said Samuel Druery his heirs and assigns forever which the said I the said John do warrant and forever defend the right title interest of unto the said Samuel Druery and his heirs and assigns forever against the claim or claims of any person or persons whatsoever In Witness whereof I the said John Druery have set my hand and affixed my seal this day and year above written
