This Indenture made this 30th day of July in the year of our Lord 1830 between Joseph Saynor of the County of Southampton of the one part, and Byrd Summer of the said County of the other part Whereas the said Joseph Saynor is partly indebted to John Moore in a sum of Ten dollars pay able on the 25th day of December next in which year he shall have an where as the said Joseph Saynor is desirous to secure the said Summer harsly left this town therefore witnesseth that the said Joseph Saynor as well in consideration of promisement as of the sum of one dollar to him in hand paid by the said Byrd Summer before the sealing and delivery hereof the receipt whereof the said Joseph harsly acknowledge the said Joseph hath granted bargained and sold to and by these presents doth grant bargain and sell unto the said Byrd Summer and to his heirs and assigns forever all his right of common grazing for to have and to hold all the said land belonging to said Joseph Saynor to him and his heirs and assigns of him the said Byrd Summer his himself, sonnes and the said Joseph his self himself with covenant and agree to and with the said Summer that the said aforesaid all the privilege appertaining thereto the said Byrd Summer his himself forever free from the claim or demand of him the said Joseph Saynor his heirs and all other persons claiming by or under him or them shall and will by these presents remain and forever defend provided nevertheless that if the said Joseph Saynor his heirs Execut or administrators do and see well and truly pay or cause to be paid unto the said John Moore or his Executors or administrators the aforesaid sum of Ten dollars with all interest and cost on or before the 25th day of December next then and in such case that Indenture and all the aforesaid Covenants granted and every clause and sentence herein contained shall cease determine and be utterly void to all intents and purposes anything herein contained to the contrary notwithstanding. This Indenture made and entered into on this 19th day of January in the Year of our Lord one thousand Eight hundred and thirty six by and between Cosby Whitfield of the County of Southampton State of Virginia of the first part Thomas Evans of the County of Southampton State of Virginia of the second part and Nicholas Brown of the County of Colington and State of North Carolina of the third and last part This Indenture sheweth as well as a Bond of an even date herewith that the said Cosby Whitfield is due and owing to the said Nicholas Brown the sum of One hundred and fifty dollars due and owing from the date hereof with interest thereon till paid up which debt and interest to the said Cosby Whitfield willing to affre and bears the amount thereof to him the said Nicholas Brown now thereof and for the further amercement of the sum of one dollar to him the said Cosby Whitfield is his bond paid by him the said Nicholas Brown the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged and from every part of which he doth say Thomas Evans and all his legal representatives or executors, successors or assigns to be the said Cosby Whitfield have hereby bargained and sold unto the said Thomas Evans his heirs and assigns the following named articles of property viz, the Bay horse three beds beds sheets and furniture one Black Walnut Table one Pew Table one safe one iron and glass one Walnut Chest one Pew Chest eight dining chairs one East Indian bed two small eight pigs two sets and hooks one Dutch oven one Spouse one bread box one looking glass one set of hand iron two fire irons two stacks blade fodder one pan stirrups one wooden set of knives and forks one set spoons a parcel of Carlton ware thirty barrels Corn meal flour weight of Pork farming utensils two axes three weeding hoes one hand sot two chain hammers
