This Indenture made this 27th day of September in the year 1830 between Henry Bloom and Elizabeth his wife of the one part, and James Bloom of the other part all of the County of Southampton and State of Virginia Whose rights shall whereas Richard Bloom by his last will and Testament duly recorded in the Clerk's Office did bequeath to James Bloom Henry Bloom Robert Bloom and Samuel Bloom children of Henry Bloom deceased a certain tract of land lying and being in Southampton County near the Appomattox Bridge which said tract of land after the decease of the said Henry Bloom deceased of the said Colony Bloom deceased by the said will devised to be sold and the money arising therefrom to be equally divided between the aforesaid James, Henry, Robert and Samuel and Robert Goodwin sons of said Henry Bloom deceased and said James, Henry, Robert and Samuel in pursuance of the said will did set up at public sale the aforesaid land whereupon James Bloom and Henry Bloom two of the legatees became the joint purchasers thereof and the said James Bloom request from the said Henry Bloom a deed for his proportionable part thereof which they are willing to do as herein after expressed. Now this Indenture further Witnesseth that the said Henry Bloom and Elizabeth Bloom his wife for and in consideration of the premises as well for and in consideration of the sum of one dollar to them in hand paid at or before the sealing and delivery of these presents the receipt whereof they doth hereby acknowledge both granted bargained and sold and do hereby these presents grant bargain and sell, unto the said James Bloom his heirs &c forever, a certain tract of land being a part of the said tract which was devised by Richard Bloom deceased as therein is mentioned reserving to himself the said Henry Bloom certain privileges herein after to be mentioned which said piece or parcel of land contains by recent survey three hundred and twenty acres and bounded as follows to wit beginning in the run of a small branch which it crosses the Appomattox a run commencing from James Bloom and Henry Bloom or Archer Dick's line thence along the road at 53 Ed 4 poles at 44, 53 poles at 34, 58 poles to a corner in said Dick's line thence along a line of marked trees 574 Ed 6 1/2 poles thence 510 p Ed 4 poles thence 58 1/2 Ed 2 p 55 Ed 4 poles thence 57 1/2 Ed 6 1/2 to a red oak thence 33 Ed 9 p thence 32 Ed 10 p thence 32 1/2 p Ed 14 p thence 33 Ed 6 poles thence 32 Ed 31 poles to an oak stump with red thence along the road nearly S 21 Ed 4 1/2 p to a red oak a corner for Richard Dick's line thence along the road S line 114 Ed 12 p thence 32 p Ed 26 p to a pine standing on said red a corner for James and Henry Bloom thence along a new line of marked trees at 125 Ed 12 p to a dogwood and hawthorn standing at an old Poplar a corner for James and Henry Bloom in Richard Dick's line thence along his line of marked trees at 57 1/2 Ed 23 p to a cedar pine thence at 60 Ed 10 poles at 13 1/2 Ed 33 p to a first oak thence at 9 Ed 10 p to a red oak thence at 40 p 40 7 p at 45 Ed 9 p thence at 52 Ed 5 p to a pine thence at 25 Ed 18 poles thence at 47 Ed 16 poles thence at 53 Ed 5 p at 40 p Ed 10 p thence at 53 p Ed 30 poles to a pine thence at 55 p Ed 9 p thence at 50 p Ed 19 poles to the aforesaid Appomattox road thence along the road at 52 Ed 38 p thence at 44 Ed 38 poles thence at 61 Ed 50 p thence at 87 Ed 14 p to the edge of the river or low ground thence along the various courses of the old road about 58 poles to a red oak at the Cypress Point thence up the River about 16 1/2 poles to the mouth of Spring branch up the Creek and branch 260 poles to the mouth of Spring branch near the bridge thence up the run of said branch 95 poles to the mouth of the first branch thence up the run of said branch 120 poles to the first station it being that part of the said tract of land of said Richard Bloom deceased on which the main iron house is situated
