This Indenture made this 8th day of November in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty one between Emory Evans a free man of black complexion about thirty four years of age seven feet eight and a half in his high of the County of Southampton of the first part, and Elizabeth Harris of the said County of the second part Witnesseth that the said Emory Evans being desirous and willing and of his own will and accord to sell and convey his freedom and become a servant to the said Elizabeth Harris and for the further consideration of the sum of One dollar to him the said Emory Evans was then paid by the said Elizabeth Harris the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged have granted bargained and sold and by these presents do give grant bargain and sell himself to be a servant slave during his life unto the said Elizabeth Harris and further the said Emory Evans doth for himself and every other person or persons who now might be concerned do warrant the right and title of himself unto the said Elizabeth Harris of him the said Emory Evans and all and every other persons and Witnesseth whereof the said Emory Evans hath hereby a knowledge that the true intent and meaning of this instrument is to convey his freedom and liberty as a free man unto the said Elizabeth Harris and the parties have hereunto set their hand and seals this day and year above written

Barnes and for the further consideration of the sum of One dollar to him the said Clarissa Hathcock was then paid by the said Edwin Barnes the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged have granted bargained and sold and by these presents do give grant bargain and sell herself to be a servant during her life unto the said Edwin Barnes in Trust for the benefit of his son John P. Barnes and further the said Clarissa doth for herself and every other person or who might be concerned warrant the right and title of herself and her increase unto him the said Edwin Barnes Trustee against the claim and demand of her the said Clarissa Hathcock and all and every other person or persons and Witnesseth whereof the said Clarissa hereby acknowledges that the true intent and meaning of this instrument is to convey her freedom and liberty as a free woman unto the said Edwin Barnes in Trust for his son John P. Barnes and the parties have hereunto set their hand and seals the day and year above written
