This Indenture made this 17<sup>th</sup> day of November in the year of our Lord Christ  
Eighteen hundred and thirty two. Between Joel Corniel and Sally his wife of the one part  
and Copeland Tarrant of the other part all of the County of Southampton Parish of Kentucky  
and State of Virginia. Whereof it is that the said Joel Corniel and Sally his wife in  
consideration of the sum of two hundred dollars of lawful money of the Commonwealth to them  
in hand paid or secured to the satisfaction of the parties, at and before the undersigned,  
brother of these presents, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged. Have bargained  
and sold and by these presents do and each of them do bargain and sell unto  
the said Copeland Tarrant his heirs and assigns a certain tract or parcel of land  
containing by estimation seventy six acres be the same more or less (it being part of the  
tract of land being Lawson's and seized and possessed of and bounded off from  
beginning at a black gum at Ballantines Mill Pond thence a line of marked  
trees to a dogwood in vicinity thence a line of marked trees to a hickory oak  
in 3<sup>rd</sup> length of land thence a line of marked trees to Black Creek thence to  
said creek and thence to the beginning. Together with all and singular  
the houses out houses edifices build ings yards, garden Orchards lan-  
diments woods ways waters and water courses profits Commodities emblements  
hereditaments and appurtenances whatsover to the said land belonging or in any  
wise appertaining to the same or any part or parcel thereof, and the reversion and  
reversions and every part and parcel thereof. To have and to hold the said  
tract of land with all the premises therein before mentioned, or intended to be  
sold, with every of their rights and titles unto the said Copeland Tarrant his heirs and  
assigns forever, to and for the only, proper use of him the said Copeland Tarrant his
