This Indenture made and entered into this 26<sup>th</sup> day of April one thousand Eight hundred and twenty four between Joseph B. Whithead and Stephen Ellsworth of the first part and Brooks R. Treguant of the second part all of the County of Southampton and State of Virginia witnesseth that whereas the said Joseph B. Whithead is partly indebted to the said Stephen Ellsworth full and just sum of Six hundred dollars due by bond bearing date with three presents, and in the sum of One hundred dollars due by bond bearing date January 1<sup>st</sup> 1834 fifty dollars being payable on or before the first day of June 1834 and fifty dollars the balance thereof payable before the 25<sup>th</sup> day of December 1834. The said Joseph B. Whithead being willing and desirous to secure the payment of the aforesaid sum of money by these presents to sell unto Brooks R. Treguant the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged the following property one negro woman named Cappy and her <sup>four</sup> children, Patty, Jane, Sime and Eliza and their freedom and his stock of hogs of every kind and description and their increase to the said Brooks R. Treguant his son and administrator also his crop of Cotton under cultivation the present year to hold the aforesaid property until the said Brooks R. Treguant his Executor and Administrator for the only use and behoof of the said Stephen Ellsworth his heirs Executors administrators and assigns this Indenture further witnesseth that the said Brooks R. Treguant will pay to the said Joseph B. Whithead to keep possession of the said property until default to make payment of the before mentioned sums of money or otherwise than and on that day the 1<sup>st</sup> day of April next or his legal Representative will cause to sell the aforesaid property as will satisfy the aforesaid bonds and interest and the costs attending the sale of the same shall be retained by the said Brooks R. Treguant. Shall pay over to the said Stephen Ellsworth his heirs or assigns the aforesaid bonds and interest and the balance of any sum over to Joseph B. Whithead or his legal expenses are paid.
