Whereas William Atkinson late of Southampton County & State of Virginia, deceased, in and about the year 1816 made his last Will and testament, in which he left all his personal estate to be equally divided between his three children namely, Polly (who has since intermarried with a certain Monroe Clements) William & George Atkinson, at the time the youngest arrived to twenty-one years which is now at this present time; and whereas the sale of the Chattel estate of the said deceased is now appraised by us about to take place, and has been done by John Davis, Jason Rivers and Benjamin Griffin; and the said Monroe Clements in right of his wife Polly, William Atkinson & George Atkinson have, and do now consent that and equal division in said slaves shall now take place agreeable to the valuation of the same made by the said appraisers, and also we as further agree to, and with each other to have ourselves our heirs executors & administrators and as bonds ourselves our heirs executors & administrators in the sum of one thousand dollars each of us to pay to the other, if we and each of us do not stand to and abide by the division to be made in said slaves by the above named appraisers which division is as followeth, Lot Number one, drawn by George Atkinson say Abbott valued at \$800 from \$600 Lester \$175 Dick & Child Monroe at \$475 making the sum of \$2050 which is \$8.33 less over one third part of the valuation which he is to pay to lot No 3, drawn by Monroe Clements. Lot Number two drawn by William Atkinson, say Bob \$625 Abbot \$580 Miller \$400- Weston \$450. Jenkins \$75 making \$2050 which is \$8.33 less one third part which he is to pay to lot No 3, drawn by Monroe Clements. Lot Number three drawn by Monroe Clements in right of his wife Polly, say Jupiter of 400 Penn \$625 Gregg \$770 & Gate \$300 making \$2025 and to receive from lots No 1 & 2 the sum of \$11.67 cents which will make ~~is~~ equal part; and now we Monroe Clements in right of his wife Polly, William Atkinson & George Atkinson do hereby bind ourselves our heirs executors & administrators to stand to and abide the foregoing division in the slaves of said and the faithful performance of the same we and each of us being ourselves our heirs to pay to the other if we or either of us do interrupt the other or others in the division as above. Witness our hands and seals this 21st day of April 1886.
