This Indenture made this 21st day of March in the year 1836 between
said Broadsheaw & her wife, of the one part and Abington Broadsheaw of the other part, on
of the County of Southampton & State of Virginia: Witnesseth that the said Matron Broadsheaw
and her wife, in consideration of the sum of Fifty five dollars of lawful money of
this Commonwealth, to them in hand paid, by the said Abington Broadsheaw at a before the
this Commonwealth, and delivery of these presents, the Receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, have her
granted and sold, and by these presents do, and each of them bargain and sell unto the
said Abington Broadsheaw, his heirs and assigns a certain tract or parcel of Land and prem-
ises containing by estimation thirty one acres more or less (it being the tract of Land former-
ly owned by Thomas Broadsheaw) and bounded by the lands of Solomon Broadsheaw, Peter
Green, Henry McHenry & Brittain Broadsheaw, references thereto being had, well more fully
appear, together with all and singular the houses, out houses, outhouses, buildings, yams, gar-
dens, ways, waters and water-courses, commodities, advantages, hereditaments, and appurtenances what-
soever to the said Land belonging or in any wise appertaining to the same or any part
or parcel thereof. To have and to hold the said 31 acres of Land with all and singular
the premises herein before mentioned or intended to be bargained and sold, unto the said Ab-
ington Broadsheaw his heirs and assigns forever: and the said Matron Broadsheaw and her
wife for themselves and their heirs, the said Land herein before mentioned with all and
singular the appurtenances mentioned, unto the said Abington Broadsheaw his heirs and assigns
forever, free from the claim or claims of them the said Matron Broadsheaw and her wife
or either of them or their heirs, and of all and other person or persons whatsoever,
shall and will warrant and forever defend by these presents. In Witness whereof the said
