This Indenture, made this Eleventh day of December in the year Eighteen hundred and thirty six between William D. Hood and Edna his Wife of the County of Southampton of the one part, and John H. Williams of said County of the other part, witnesseth that the said William D. Hood and Edna his Wife in consideration of nine Hundred Dollars lawful money of Virginia a sum in hand paid by the sd. John H. Williams at or before the making and delivery of these presents, have bargained and sold and by these presents do and each of them doth bargain and sell unto the said John H. Williams his heirs and assigns a certain tract or parcel of land lying in the aforesaid County of Southampton and bounded as follows, to wit, on the East by the Lands of Lydia Rollings, South by the Lands of said Rollings and Jeremiah Cobb, West by the lands of Othelando C. Briggs, and the lands belonging to the estate of Joseph Dooley deceased from which it is separated by the Indian Branch on the North by the lands of Othelando C. Briggs, containing thira hundred and Thirtysix acres, to the same more or less, together with all and singular the appurtenances with the reversion and reversions, remainder and remainders, yearly and other rents, issues and profits thereof, and of every part and parcel thereof to have and to hold the tract or parcel of land with the tenements, hereditaments and all and singular the premises herein before mentioned or intended to be bargained and sold and every part and parcel thereof with every of their rights, members and appurtenances unto the said John H. Williams, his heirs and assigns forever. And the sd. William D. Hood and Edna his Wife for themselves and their heirs the said tract of land with all and singular the premises of appurtenances before mentioned unto the said John H. Williams his heirs and assigns free from the claim or claims of them the said William D. Hood and Edna his Wife, or either of them, their or either of their heirs and of all and every person or persons whatsoever shall, will, and do warrant and forever defend by these presents. This Indenture made this 17th day of October in the year one thousand eight hundred and twenty eight between Elisha Joyner and Mrs. Polly Joyner of the one part, and Sam Powers, all of Southampton County, of the other part, witnesseth that the said Elisha Joyner and Polly his wife, for and in consideration of the sum of Twenty dollars to them in hand paid by the said Sam Powers, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged by the said Elisha Joyner and Polly his wife they have sold and delivered unto the said Sam Powers and his heirs forever, a certain parcel of Land lying in Blackwater Islands adjoining the lands of said Sam Powers and containing by estimation four acres to the same more or less and bounded as follows, to wit, beginning at a live oak standing near the run of the Horse Bone branch a former fence and left tree between the said Powers & Joyner thence a line of marked trees to a larch stands on the south side of the Black fish hole (which
