

Do hereby his heirs and assigns forever The following property to wit: fourteen head of hogs four cattle three sheep one horse cart & wheels two plows three working hoes one grubbing hoe one pair of Iron wedges three axes three beds beds and furniture two chairs one trunk one safe one pair of iron bars one pair of iron pins one oven one frying pan, one broad hoe one walnut table and two pine tables with all the inbred right title claim or demand of the above mentioned articles, To have and to hold the same hereby granted or intended to be granted property hereby conveyed unto the said Robert Drury his heirs executors or assigns forever. And the said Joseph Drury for himself his heirs executors and assigns does hereby covenant promise and agree to and with the said Robert Drury his heirs executors and assigns in manner and form following that is to say that the said Joseph Drury his heirs executors and assigns shall and lawfully shall defend by these presents upon trial or the help that the said Robert Drury his heirs executors or assigns shall permit the said Joseph Drury to remain in quiet and peaceable possession of the said hereby conveyed property and to take the profits thereof to his own proper use until default be made in the payment of the said sum of one hundred and seventy five dollars either in whole or in part and there upon this further trust that the said Robert Drury his heirs executors or assigns shall and will so soon after the happening of such default of payment as he his heirs executors and assigns shall think proper or the said Samuel McDonald his heirs executors or assigns shall request sell the before mentioned property to the highest bidder for cash at public auction after having fixed the time of sale at his own discretion and giving ten days notice thereof at four different public places in the county previous to the day of sale and out of the money arising from the said sale shall after satisfying the charges thereof and all other expenses attending the said sale pay the said Samuel McDonald his heirs executors or assigns the sum before mentioned with lawful interest thereon and the balance if any pay over to the said Joseph Drury his heirs executors or assigns but if the whole of the above mentioned sum shall be fully paid and discharged to the said Samuel McDonald his heirs executors or assigns so that no default of payment shall be made then this indenture to be void or else to remain in full force and virtue. This indenture made this 1<sup>st</sup> day of March 1839 between Thomas James Hunt and Elizabeth his wife of the county of Southampton and state of Virginia of the one part and John A. Hill of the same county and state of the other part witnesseth that the said John A. Hill answered for and in consideration of the sum of Three hundred dollars lawful money of Virginia to him in hand paid by the said John A. Hill at or before the executing and delivery of these presents do bargain and sell unto John A. Hill his heirs and assigns a certain tract or parcel of land lying and being in the county of Southampton and state of Virginia on the North side of Peacock swamp containing by estimation one hundred and seventy acres more or less it being a tract of land given to Richard Hunt his brother provided that he died leaving a legal heir and in consequence of his having made the said Richard Hunt his heir it proved him it being the intention of his father will Richard Hunt he should do so and which land is bounded as follows by the land belonging to Benjamin Hill on the North Benjamin Hill on the West John A. Hill on the South and Nancy Hunt on the East together with and singular the houses barns buildings Stables yards gardens orchards lands tenements meadows pastures feedings commons woods undivided
