 between James Looke and his wife Betsey of the first part and John Brown of the second part. Witnesseth that
 the said James Looke and his wife Betsey in consideration of the sum of _____ dollars Current
 Money of Virginia to them in hand paid by John Brown at and before the executing and delivering
 of these presents the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged have bargained and sold and by these
 presents do and each of them do bargain and sell unto the said John Brown his heirs and assigns
 of Brown's certain piece of Land containing _____ acres be the same more or less and all the tenor thereof
 April 28. 1681. Bounded as follows (to wit) by the land of John Boykin from Tucker Swamp to a gum corner
 between said Boykin and said Looke thence a line of Marked Trees to a willow Oak
 Corner Tree between Joshua Pasford James Looke and the said piece of Land thence down
 a little Branch to Tucker Swamp the dividing line between the said Pasford and the said
 piece of Land. To have and to hold the said Piece of Land with all the Tenor thereof and
 every thing else attached to the said Land herein before mentioned or intended to be
 bargained and sold) and every part and parcel thereof with every of their rights manors and
 appurtenances unto the said John Brown his heirs and assigns forever. To and for the only proper
 use and behoof of him the said John Brown his heirs and assigns forever. And the said
 James Looke and his wife Betsey for themselves and their heirs the said Land with all and
 singular the promises before mentioned unto the said John Brown his heirs and assigns fore-
 ever the Claim or Claims from them the said James Looke and his wife Betsey or of either of
 them or their heirs and of all and every other person or persons whatsoever shall and do
 warrant and forever defend by these presents. In Witness whereof the said James Looke and
