We Jesse Little and James Ellis, both of the County of Southampton and State of Virginia, disagreeing about a certain line between us in consequence of the two not being marked out to the corner, and the corner tree a pine called for by said Ellis dead being dead and gone, We the said Little and Ellis do by mutual consent on the thirtieth day of August in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty, get the following gentlemen (Witness) William S. Seale, William C. Seale, Henry M. Butts, John C. C., and William H. Cobb, to examine the dead and run the line between us which they did to run, running a straight line from a sand oak in the north of a cane between us and running thence nearly a south east course to a Sassafras post, a new corner made; from thence a short line nearly a northeast corner to a pine the first for and all tree in the old line on the pererson side. Now we the said Jesse Little and James Ellis do hereby agree that the said new line shall be permanent between us, and our heirs forever, and we do hereby bind ourselves, our heirs, executors, administrators and assigns to stand to
