This Indenture made between and entered into this day of in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred fifty, between Nathl. P. Phillips of the first part and William St. Garden of the other part, whereas by virtue of a decree of the honourable court of the County of Southampton entered the 19th day of August 1850, in the case of Wm. St. Garden and wife vs. P. Hicks it was ordered and decreed that the said Nathl. P. Phillips be a commissioneer to sell the land mentioned in said decree upon a credit of six months (except so much as will be required to pay cost & charges of suit and sale which is required in cash) and after advertising the time and place of sale according to the said decree did advertise to sale before the Courthouse door of Southampton County the last of said land mentioned in said decree on Monday the 18th day of November 1850, that being Court day, and William St. Garden became the highest bidder and purchased at the sum of one hundred and seventy two dollars. Whereupon that for and in consideration of the sum of hundred and seventy two dollars aforesaid to him the said Nathl. P. Phillips in hand paid by the said William St. Garden at and before the sealing and delivery of these presents, the receipt whereof is hereby fully acknowledged hath granted, bargained and sold unto the said William St. Garden his heirs and assigns a certain tract or parcel of land (mentioned in said decree) situate, lying and being in the County aforesaid containing by estimation County two acres more or less and bounded by Waterway on the west, by the land of Jonathan Seewer on the south, and the land belonging to the heirs of Edwin Marks dec'd on the north & east, and is known as part of the McNeale land. To have and to hold the above granted and assigned premises with all the appurtenances thereto unto the said William St. Garden his heirs and assigns to their proper use, benefit and behoof forever and the said Nathl. P. Phillips, commissioneer aforesaid) for himself, his heirs, executors and administrators do here by relinquish and absolutely release his right, title and interest in the above mentioned premises, together with all houses, orchards, woods, ways, water courses and hereditaments thereto belonging or in any wise appertaining unto the said William St. Garden his heirs, executors and assigns forever. And the said Nathl. P. Phillips do hereby covenant warrant and defend against the claim or claim of all every person or persons whatsoever claiming by or under him as commissioneer.
